Now, people are always finding fault with the church. In fact, there are far too many people who are far too good at pointing out what they think is wrong in the church. Well, unless you haven't figured it out, no local church is perfect. Anytime people are involved in an organization, that organization will be far less than perfect. Therefore, if you are looking for fault, you can be sure that you will find it! I think that I shall never see, A church that's all it ought to be: A church whose members never stray, Beyond the strait and narrow way; A church that has no empty pews, Whose pastor never has the blues, A church whose deacons always deak, And none is proud, and all are meek; Where gossips never peddle lies, Or make complaints or criticize; Where all are always sweet and kind, And all to others' faults are blind. Such perfect churches there may be, But none of them are known to me. But still, we'll work, and pray, and plan To make our own the best we can.

It is possible to be a Christian without going to Church, but it is impossible to be a <u>good</u> Christian, a <u>growing</u> Christian, and a <u>godly</u> Christian.

## Being a Christian without going to Church is like:

- A student who will not go to school.
- A soldier who will not join the army.
- A citizen who will not vote.
- A salesman without customers.
- A seaman without a ship.
- A parent without a family.
- A football player without a team.
- A bee without a hive.

Every Christian should get in Church, join the Church and attend the Church. It is an important and essential part of the Christian life.

In our text, in verse 25, the writer tells us: "*Not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together, as the manner of some is...*" Apparently there were some in those days that were taking the matter of Church lightly.

The charge is made in light of several truths. **Three times** he says, "**Let us**." Notice 3 reasons why we should take the matter of Church serious and why it is an important building block of the faith.
